

THE PEOPLE V. SMITH

are on the final question on Who Wants to Be a Millionaire and Meredith Vieira asks you, "What is the name of the first California Supreme

Court case?" You have no idea but want the million. Time is running out, so you think statistically of the number of criminal cases filed and one of the most common surnames and blurt out *The People v. Smith.* And of course, you are right. Good luck with the million. You will be lucky to have \$50,000 left after taxes, long lost friends and relatives.

My article on book burning last month (Fahrenheit 451) led me to review the first volume of California Reports (1850-51) and the first case from the California Supreme Court, The People v. Smith, 1 Cal. 9 (1850). By now, you as the alert reader are asking, "Well, if People v. Smith starts on page 9, then what case is on pages 1-8?" Good question.

Actually, pages 1-8 are a preface which gives a pretty interesting discussion by then-Justice Nathaniel Bennett on the legal history of California leading up to the first California Supreme Court. You start to understand the problems encountered by that original court when you read about the melting pot of laws, codes and ordinances laid before them on opening day. California had been operating for decades under the codes of Spain, royal and vice-royal ordinances, laws of the imperial Congress of Mexico, presidential regulations and acts of proconsular governors. Throw in a few decrees from dictators and you have a really good bar exam question.

To add to this mix, some of the laws of Mexico were never printed or could not be obtained without great difficulty. Some laws were simply not enforced (sound familiar?). Land had never previously had much value and was often not worth the trouble of surveying or perfecting title under the laws of Spain and Mexico. A person's wealth

was measured in cattle and horses. Land was vast and expensive to maintain. This all changed with the California Gold Rush, when land and its precise boundaries were of great value.

Under Mexican law, legal matters were heard and decided by the Alcalde, who acted asa city mayor and judge. This system was left in place for a short time by California military governors until replaced in 1850. The Alcaldes also made land grants, but title to this land was often in question. Justice Bennett noted that the Alcalde paid "little regard either to American or Mexican law further than suited their own convenience and conduced to their own profit."

So this background sets the stage for the first case of *People v. Smith*. The defendants had been accused of shooting and killing several Indians in Napa Valley, burning their lodges and destroying wheat, barley and other property. The defendants petitioned to be discharged from custody of the Sheriff of the District of Sonoma under a writ of habeas corpus. First, the defendants claimed the affidavit for the warrant was defective. That argument failed. Their next argument was that they could be held indefinitely since the judges in the District Court of said District of Sonoma were not appointed. Clever, but that argument failed too.

The third argument was a little more creative for that time. They argued that the offense was not within the state of California. The Supreme Court noted that the offense was committed at the ranch of Henry Fowler and William Hargrave (which we all know is in Napa Valley) and of course Napa Valley is in the state of California.

The court faced a small problem since it recognized that "there is no jail or prison in which prisoners can be kept with security" in the then wine tasting-less and uncivilized Napa Valley. So the defendants were ordered to provide at least two good and sufficient sureties in the collective sum of ten thousand dollars, or separately one surety each of three thousand dollars (large sums then). The surety had to be worth double the amount of the claims. The defendants would then be

released from detention. If not, they would be remanded to the custody of the Sheriff of Sonoma (the same foregoing mentioned Sheriff without a jail).

So ends the first California Supreme Court case, which confirmed that Napa Valley was, thank goodness, part of California. The first reporter appointed by the Supreme Court for this case was Edward Norton (who as we all know went on to become a very successful movie star and can transform himself into the Incredible Hulk). For an interesting review of the same case and Ed Norton read Judge Dan McNearney's *The Seminal Case*, 46-APR Orange County Law, 21 (2004).

For those curious readers, the second California Supreme Court case, 1 Cal. 15, offers a much better title. The case of *Luther v. The Master and Owners of Ship Apollo* actually sounds like a 2 a.m. sci-fi movie, but it's just another shipping titan failing to pay a poor sailor \$166.

Slaughter to the Rescue

Kudos to **Bill Slaughter** of Procter, Slaughter and Reagan. Bill's intuition and keen sight helped to spot and rescue four hikers in Ojai during a March 2011 winter storm. The story, *A Rescue to Remember*, was featured in the June 25 edition of the *Ventura County Star*.



HOW WOULD WE DO IT WITHOUT HER? SPOTLIGHT ON CELENE VALENZUELA

After a process nearly as long and contentious as negotiating the federal debt ceiling increase, Barristers of Ventura County has concluded its bar-wide logo contest. As announced in last month's "Exec's Dot... Dot..." the winner by a clear majority was the Bar Association's own administrative assistant, Celene Valenzuela. I had a chance to sit down with Celene and discuss what she does when she's not fixing our logos.

At the same desk she's been at for the last five years, Celene is our go-to for all things related to the Bar — many of us know her work without knowing her. Perhaps we have received emails from her as bar@vcba.org; or seen the photos, CITATIONS articles, and announcements she posts on the Bar website. She also acts as the reservation desk, membership coordinator, MCLE coordinator, and CITATIONS advertising contact. On top of all of this, she handles all other forms of event coordination for committee meetings, MCLE events, and our Bar's annual events, such as the Law Day 5K and the annual VCBA dinner. The public knows her as the first contact for the bar's pro bono program and Lawyer Referral Information Service.

Each of these programs is dear to her heart, and she loves the interaction both with the public and with our membership. But she is especially proud of the pro bono program.

Celene spends the better part of each day (after helping Steve practice his Spanish) reviewing e-mail requests from the public for help with their legal problems. "It's sad because we don't have enough resources to help them all," she says. Clients seeking help also sometimes just walk right in to the bar office, although calls or emails are preferred. "Alex [client relations manager Alejandra Varela-Guerra] and I do what we can to determine their legal situation. If they can go to a legal clinic for help, we send them there." Otherwise, they do an intake to determine whether the potential client meets the state poverty requirements, or otherwise qualifies

for government assistance. Unfortunately, even if they qualify, there is no guarantee that they will get free assistance. "We have a huge load of clients who need assistance but not a lot of attorneys who volunteer."

Even if no active attorney is available, the pro bono Department will have the clients speak with one of the retired attorneys. And, if there is a hearing coming up, the retired attorneys can help by instructing them how to get a continuance while they seek further counsel. The pro bono program does not service criminal cases, plaintiff cases, support issues, or cases for clients who otherwise do not qualify. Those cases are referred out through the LRIS program.

Although the pro bono program has many retired attorney volunteers, there is a real need for more volunteer active attorneys. Celene encourages everyone to sign up for either LRIS or the Bar's pro bono program (or both) by calling her directly, but she has also provided the information and sign-up forms on the Bar's website at www.vcba.org.

You also may contact Celene if you are interested in doing an MCLE program. The Bar sections do these regularly; you probably have attended one from the Probate and Estate Planning, Business Litigation, VCTLA, or IP sections. But law firms often set up their own programs for MCLE credit. If you are interested in doing a program, simply contact her and send in the materials you intend to use. Celene will help with registration and reservations. Bar members who wish to put on programs at the Bar office may use the Ventura College of Law classrooms for free. Similarly, if you attended an MCLE through the Bar, but forgot to sign up for credit or lost your certificate, Celene can make sure you get credit.

You also may have seen Celene's recent work as the designer of the fundraising postcard for the pro-bono program. Celene is assisting **Jonathan Light** and **Joe Strohman** to

ESTATE ADMINISTRATION AND THE "MAILBOX RULE" – AN EVIDENTIARY PRESUMPTION

Many times those small details relating to the administration of an estate can mean the difference between a routine case and one that may present significant liability to the attorney representing the personal representative. When assisting with the administration of an estate, it may be wise to add one extra step when providing notices to creditors, especially when a creditor is the Department of Health Care Services (the "Department") relating to Medi-Cal reimbursement claims. It is strongly suggested that you mail all notices to the Department certified and request a return receipt.

It is well known that the "mailbox rule" provides that a letter correctly addressed and properly mailed is presumed to have been received in the ordinary course of mail. However, a presumption of receipt is rebutted upon testimony denying receipt. (Evidence Code §641.) Therefore, when testimony is presented to the court denying receipt of the document in question the presumption is gone and the trier of fact must then weigh the denial of receipt against the inference of receipt arising from proof of mailing and decide whether or not the document was received. (*Craig v. Brown & Root* (2000) 84 Cal.App.4th 416, 422.)

In *Shewry v. Wooten* (2009) 172 Cal.App.4th 741, the decedent Dowe received Medi-Cal

benefits of \$200,000 for her medical care and treatment. Months after Dowe's death, the Department sent a Medi-Cal Estate Questionnaire form to Dowe's daughter who completed the form and returned it to the Department. The form disclosed that Dowe, at the time of her death, owned property worth an estimated \$250,000. An estate was opened and the Department filed a creditor's claim for \$200,000 against the estate. The executor rejected the Department's creditor's claim as being untimely. The Department filed suit on the rejected claim.

The Department claimed it was not time-barred since it did not *receive* the notice regarding the claim. At trial, the Department called its tax compliance representative, who testified that if the Department had received the notice, the Department "would have sent a formal claim to the attorney and made a case note to reflect that it did go out on that date." Under standard procedures, "all documents that come into the Department's estate recovery unit are logged into the system and therefore reflected in the case notes." There was no case note in the file, which created the inference that the Department had not received it.

The executor's attorney testified that she did not dictate the notice to her secretary, rather she "pretty much told her what to say and she typed it." The attorney further testified that she did not witness her secretary mail the letter, but that "I don't see her do half of the things in my office, but they always [get done]."

Presented with competing facts relating to mailing and receipt of notice, the court must weigh denial of receipt against the inference of receipt arising from proof of mailing and decide whether or not notice was received (*Slater v. Kehoe* (1974) 38 Cal.App.3d 819, 832). Resolution of these disputed facts is a credibility call that must be supported by substantial evidence. Specific findings relating to the credibility of witnesses and the weight of the evidence will enhance the chances of the decision not being disturbed on appeal (*Craig v. Brown & Root, supra,* at p. 421).

The trial court in *Shewry v. Wooten*, upheld on appeal, found that the executor did *not* provide notice of the decedent's death in the manner required by law to trigger the four month claim period in which to present a claim (See Probate Code §215). The trial court went on to say that if the personal representative "was truly interested in providing notice, she should have guaranteed receipt/notice by the logical options, 'certified, registered, and express mail" as provided in Probate Code §215.

The lesson is simple: Provide notice as described above, and be ready to offer evidence to rebut the presumption of the mail box rule or refute the assertion that "notice was not received."



SCV LEGAL AID: FROM LAWYER TO PEOPLE

In a laundromat converted to a city community center in North Fillmore, Santa Clara Valley Legal Aid's nine volunteer attorneys assist in family law, employment law, landlord-tenant law, consumer rights, and civil issues. But most of what happens in the small room is translation, not from English to Spanish, well, that too, but from Lawyer to People. As attorneys, we are specially trained in the legal language and the rigors of court procedures. But for people who have never entered the legal system, we speak a foreign language.

Why is a divorce called a dissolution? Perhaps an "Order to Show Cause" could be changed to: "The Court Has a Question, Please Come By." An eviction is a traumatic and swift judicial remedy that is couched as an "Unlawful Detainer." A "Three Day Notice to Quit" does not mean that after your long weekend your job is finished. "Probate" is not an internal organ or money that you're getting back from your purchaseit's a very complex set of boxes to check. A lawsuit is actually a "Complaint" and I just got a "Summons", am I supposed to go somewhere?

I had a woman tell me that she had been trying for a month to find a judge to sign a "Letter of Testamentary" so that she could file a life insurance claim. All she needed was some simple "letter" from a judge- a one-page judicial council form with 6 boxes checked with pretty purple seals in the corners. It's difficult for her to understand that "Letters Testamentary" take around \$1,000 in filing and publication fees and over a month to get. And why isn't it called something logical like "Authority of Executor"?

Mediation may involve going into a quiet corner and becoming quiet with your inner self, but you're most likely to be joined in a conference room with attorneys. I thought Laches were things on my door? How in this epidemic of hand sanitizers can they claim "Unclean Hands"? "Statute of Frauds"— maybe we could say "Show Me The Writing." "Parol Evidence" inmates giving evidence to a panel to justify release? Estoppel? Estopped to Deny? Generally denying? Specially denying?

What's with the "Consolidated Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act" for my health insurance—COBRA? Really?

We send clients to file papers at "the County" on their way to see their POS to ask the PD what the DA is doing with the TRO and DV charges.

After not qualifying for the HAMP program, the couple had some real estate questions. Getting his ARM free from his APR, and their APN from the MLS we discussed FHA, HUD issues, TIs, HOAs. What about Section 8? What was the property's FMV? The buyer wants a 1031. Sign the PCOR. Should we do a Prop 58? Why is a TIN called an EIN?

A distraught woman is unable to grasp that the certified judgment signed by a judge that she worked for months getting through Ventura County's court system is now just worth the paper it is printed on because the debtor filed a Chapter 7 in CDBC via ECF listing the suit on the SOFA, she filed a Proof

of Claim with the UST, skipped the 341 and now the debt is discharged. "But I have a signed judgment," she pleads in absolute confusion. "The judge SIGNED it."

I share her confusion. I am bewildered and confused. A man who was speaking English to me on the phone has just arrived to inquire about my WEP key, my IP address and the location of my router. Pardon me? Sputtering and trying to hold my stance, I know that I am going to be a member of the AARP before I understand him, and soon I may need CPR. Have I signed my AHCD? My POLST? CUTMA accounts for kids? 529s? Are my VCBA dues paid? I see this look every day as I translate for others. The tech can help me navigate his language; we attorneys can help our clients navigate ours.



UNIQUE PROGRAM GENERATES REFERRALS FOR LOCAL ATTORNEYS

A novel and unique pilot program between the Ventura County Lawyer Referral and Information Service (LRIS) and the Conejo Valley Chamber of Commerce brings new opportunities to local attorneys and local businesses. In light

of the changing economy, **Steven Lehat** spearheaded this stimulating program to create a bridge between the needs of local business owners and to generate attorney referrals. The program provides Chamber members with referrals to local attorneys through its "Affinity Program."

Many business owners do not consult an attorney until there is a problem. A "win-win" for both sides, the Affinity Program allows business owners to develop relationships with attorneys so they will be comfortable seeking guidance throughout the growth of their businesses. Attorneys will have the ability to mix and mingle with Chamber members at such monthly events as "Jump Start Networking Breakfasts," "Lunch and Learn," "Networking at Night Mixers" and other Chamber events.

Lehat is the driving force behind the Affinity Program. Since the early 90s, Lehat has created many other innovative programs between referral services and chambers of commerce across the United States. He developed a successful practice in the Newport Beach area specializing in intellectual property, securities and international trade. Recently, Lehat opened an office in Ventura County. Looking to contribute to the local legal community, Lehat joined the LRIS board in December 2010. The Chamber's professionalism, commitment to its members, and their demographics motivated Lehat to pioneer the Affinity Program.

To receive referrals from Chamber members, attorneys must first enroll or already be members of LRIS. Next, attorneys contact **Alex Varela-Guerra** at VCBA, (805)650-

7599 to obtain an application for the Conejo Valley Chamber of Commerce Pilot Program. Once enrolled, attorneys will be eligible to receive referrals from Chamber members. In exchange, attorneys should be committed to giving a discount to Chamber members on a case—by-case basis.

Attorneys enrolled in the pilot program will also have access to specific programs targeted at the business aspect of building and running a law practice. Each quarter will bring a different state-of-the-art program focused on assisting a law firm's function as a business. Attorneys will also have the opportunity to make 30-minute presentations about his or her area of expertise directly to Chamber members at

"Lunch and Learn" events. Participation in this program will create great opportunities for attorneys not only to obtain new clients but also to build relationships within the local business community that may allow them to become long-term, trusted advisors.









There, we will meet traditional leaders of these Mayan communities and gain a deeper understanding of traditional legal models.

The legal systems are no exception and pre-Columbian jurisprudence continues to develop. The Land of Eternal Spring is always a beautiful place to visit, and in late spring it is less "touristy." We hope to time our trip to conclude immediately prior to Holy Week (Semana Santa) allowing you to extend your stay to enjoy this colorful and festive time.


